The Pilgrim's Progress Chapter 17 – "The Pilgrims Meet the Flatterers" October 29, 2014

"Many tickle with one hand, to strike with the other - pleasing in order to betray. The flatterer is a vile reptile; like a boa-constrictor, he covers his victim with saliva, and then proceeds to swallow him."

Charles Spurgeon

I. Context

A. Definitions

- 1. Flatter: to praise excessively especially from motives of self-interest.
- 2. Straight and narrow path: represents the revealed will of God for the Christian life.
- 3. Why is the Flatterer described as a dark man with a very light robe?

II. The Flatterer

- A. Warnings from Scripture
 - 1. (Mt 7:15-20) Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves.
 - 2. (Acts 20:28-30) Fierce wolves will come in among the Ephesians.
 - 3. (2 Cor 11:12-15) <u>Disguise</u> themselves as apostles of Christ and servants of righteousness.
 - 4. (Jude and 2 Peter 2) Parallel Passages False prophets will secretly bring in destructive heresies following their sensuality and in their greed they will exploit Christians with false words.
 - 5. (Rom 6:18) Serve their own appetites, and by <u>smooth</u> talk and <u>flattery</u> they deceive the hearts of the naïve.
 - 6. (Phil 3:17-19) Their end is destruction and their god is their belly.

"Too often the god is Mammon, who is as degraded a deity as any of them. Such turn religion into a means of gain, and would sell Jesus himself for silver. The sin of Judas is one of which we may say, "So do they unto this day." Judas is an apostle, he listens to the Master's words, he preaches at the Master's command, and he works miracles in the Master's name; he also keeps the bag and manages the finance for Christ's little company, and he does it so carefully and economically that what he filches for himself is not missed, and he remains in good repute. Judas professes to serve Jesus, but all the while he is really serving himself, for secretly he abstracts from the treasury somewhat for his own pocket. "He had the bag and kept that which was put therein." There are such still in the churches of God: they do not actually steal, but they follow Jesus for what they can make or get out of him and his disciples. The symbols of their worship are the loaf and the fish. Now, this is as degrading a form of worship as the adoration of graven images. Gain is the god of many in all congregations: they seek Jesus, not because they care for his words, but because they eat of the loaves. They fear the Lord, but they serve other gods." Oct 2,1881 CHS
